

Why are bandicoots important?

Nature's gardeners, Southern Brown Bandicoots dig and turn over the soil through the Park seeking fungi and insects for a feast. Known as ecosystem engineers, they help to keep our bushland healthy by aerating the soil, moving seeds, and encouraging fungi to grow.
